2024 Chair's Report

2024 has been a busy year. Many thanks go to all the management committee, many of whom are here tonight, for their commitment and time spent working to improve and grow tennis in Northants.

Our sub-committee structure has developed and working in smaller groups with specific aims has proved highly productive.

The Governance subcommittee worked tirelessly through the LTA framework and by Autumn ensured that we are 100% compliant. A great team effort for all involved. Thank-you.

2024 saw the Performance and Competition Subcommittee established, and has already made significant progress across its remit including growing seniors tennis and establishing a new seniors organiser role, and adding more mini-red opportunities through the winter.

After a few hurdles along the way we managed to secure a Participation lead, and Leo Tutt has the experience and knowledge to really help us grow our tennis community. Although he has only been working with us from late 2024, Leo has quickly established many relationships with many clubs and has plans with each of those to boost participation in the months to come.

The County Closed moved to a new venue, at Northampton County LTC and saw adult events, for the first time in quite a few years, alongside the many different junior age events. There was fierce competition and a great atmosphere. Thanks to Laura and Bridget for such a smoothly run event. I know there are plans for even more events this year so watch this space!

Last year we explained that we would like to review the structure of our organisation. At our club forum, clubs had the opportunity to ask questions and find out more about it. There is a report on this later, but I would like to thank Richard Johns for all his diligent work on this and Stuart Farquhar for his time and expertise.

Our workforce development programme is continuing to deliver training to potential new coaches, with more candidates already signed up for this year. Thanks to Justin Chacksfield who has steered the new coaches along the way.

SAFEGUARDING REPORT 2024

A change of Regional Manager was not too helpful for our county. A couple of clubs were targeted for "unannounced visits". One club had immense difficulty in receiving information for registering and others were at one stage deciding whether or not to register. In all there were five visits and one that had to be cancelled, but all passed.

Every club was contacted to sign any of their 14-24 year olds onto the YOUNG PERSON'S WELFARE AMBASSADOR 12 MONTH PROGRAMME. This is for young people to gain confidence, improve their confidence in public speaking, listening to their peers and children with help from their club welfare officer. This also helps towards their university or job applications- very similar to the Duke of Edinburgh Awards. A safeguarding survey was issued nationally and many youngsters were unaware of who to contact if necessary. Please ensure that the Welfare Officer picture and contact number are well signposted.

On a VERY positive note we had a good report from Jon Thursfield (our newly appointed regional manager in May 2024) who came to our County Closed Competition in August. My thanks go to Bridget and Laura who had EVERYTHING required to have the competition hit the 100% result. He was particularly impressed with the notices, signing in sheets, daily welcome meetings, enough supervision and hardly any problems on or off the court.

There were a few minor safeguarding issues this year that were dealt with quickly within the clubs and a couple of other cases that needed escalating to the LTA team.

We are now in the Central and East Area, Jon has now left as of January 21 st and our new Regional Manager is Melissa Miller who will be informing us of the visits she hopes to do in 2025. Some will be unannounced where she will just turn up and check for policies, telephone numbers and officials. Please ensure these are all updated – all information is on the County and LTA website. There are quarterly meetings a year and a conference in October all on zoom or teams with current information. Our representative at Northamptonshire Sport Vickie Merrick has also left, her replacement is Lijana Kasiziu. She will also be contacting all the clubs to offer help and advice if needed within our county.

To make it a hattrick I am also resigning. I would like to say a big thankyou to Carol who intercepts many issues including safeguarding and with new personnel onboard in both associations I hope Northants continue to have less complaints and cases similar to this year for the new County Safeguarding Officer.

MEN'S SUMMER COUNTY CUP REPORT

Three veterans of the Northamptonshire tennis scene briefly sat earnestly in debate while overseeing the machinations of a food bank in the town on Friday morning.

Word had filtered back from Eastbourne that things were going unexpectedly well in the LTA Summer Championships... It was shocking news!

Discussing the unlikely scenario of the county men having already registered two victories in the first four days in Group 1 for the first time in living memory, and quite probably history, one of them summed up the occasion with equal doses of wit and brevity.

"Arise, Sir Mark Taylor!" he said.

No such honour is likely to be forthcoming for the county men's captain, but that was never the intention. Comparisons of David versus Goliath are not unfitting given the achievement, so a medal of some description would not be inappropriate, or at least a little recognition.

All that is before anyone considers Taylor's 30 years at the helm, which wouldn't ordinarily be good for anyone's mental, or indeed physical health.

One time Northamptonshire linchpin Richard Ward, whose son Alex was in the line-up, and who now lives in the Borders, was at the forefront of those showering praise on Taylor and their crew.

In offering congratulations, he said: "You have made people think about Northants tennis in a different way," adding: "the county had never won a match in Group 1 for 70-odd years."

Prior to last week, Northants had only ever spent two summers in the top division, in 1954 and 2001, Taylor steering them there on the latter occasion.

A 6-3 win over Hertfordshire on Tuesday and a bad-tempered, fiery 5-4 success at the expense of Kent on Thursday ensured Northants will once again be playing in Group 1 in 2025. On other days there were losses to East of Scotland

(2-7), Surrey (2-7) and North of Scotland (1-5). Surrey retained their title, winning on all five days.

"We (Northants) have finished fourth in the country which was an amazing effort from the guys," said Taylor.

Strength in depth has never been a strong suit for Northants but as Taylor readily points out, it is all about the players who choose to commit to the cause. A certain outmoded sense of loyalty binds them all together.

"Most of these guys are in work, so not only are they giving up a week's salary but holiday as well," said Taylor.

Injuries, aches and pains inevitably take their toll on what could in theory ask each player to commit to 45 sets of men's doubles spread over five days. Of course, this never quite materialises but it is necessary to have back-up cover close at hand, especially when the venue is a good three-and-a half-hour drive away.

Taylor was rocked in the preparation by news that Charlie Swallow, one of his mainstays over the years, had needed an operation after damaging pectoral muscles playing cricket.

Although there was tinkering to the line-ups down the week, the regular parings were: Joe Tyler/Jack Haworth, Kyle Rae/James Smith and Alex Ward/Max Graham.

Jakob Bonnett, who was 18 on Christmas Eve and who is off to the USA in September, filled in at intervals, especially on the Tuesday against Hertfordshire when Smith stepped down after the first round, suffering the after-effects of a sapping illness.

Bonnett proceeded to team up with Rae, helping to win the next two matches.

The opening day's 7-2 loss against East of Scotland saw wins for Haworth/Tyler and Rae/Smith but three match tie-breaks were lost 10-7 in the first round which set the tone for the day.

Then came the Hertfordshire win when a reverse of fortune saw five match tiebreaks won, Haworth/Tyler and Ward/Graham collecting two wins apiece during the course of the day. Bonnett/Rae and Ward/Graham each bagged one win against Surrey on Wednesday as a consolation before the titanic tussle with Kent, the only county who failed to get a win all week. With the scores tied at 4-4, Rae/Smith grabbed the decisive rubber.

Northants could still have been relegated going into the final day which ended with a 5-1 loss to North of Scotland. However, Surrey's win against Hertfordshire confirmed Northants would stay up.

Junior Report 2024

Numbers in County Training generally continue to be pretty healthy. The county girls' teams have generally been stronger than the boys for some reason this year? We did well across the board in the 12 counties events, but found it very tough to field competitive teams, especially on the boys side for county cups. For a variety of reasons we seemed to have our number 1 players absent for many county cup events (5 out of 12), which had a real impact for the teams. We have adapted our eligibility criteria and offered support for players at national level to encourage them to continue to represent Northants whenever possible. Early signs suggest this might be helping.

At an individual level special mentions to Oskar Laskowski, Leah and Tegan Bush who are all involved in national age group activity, Kacper Laskowski, Joshua Wright, Sophia Agius and Esme Gallon who have places at regional player development centres, and Olivia Samoila, Alfie Felstead and Kamilah Djida who have all been involved in regional training camps for U9/10

More concerning for the future is the general level of our minis coming through isn't great (and this year we are very low on numbers on the girls side for the u8's). We have introduced an indoor county series of mini-red events and put on more mini-red county sessions to help tackle this. We also ought to note that two unfillable team gaps exist in the programme post-covid (u12 boys and u11 girls).

Our performance plan, has now seen the role out of parent education sessions to u8/9 and 10 age groups (which has seen an improvement of competition programmes followed by our minis), 2 of our county captains supporting delivery of regional training camps for their professional development, and 6 workshops delivered to 7 aspiring county captains, who have taken up vice-captaincy/captaincy roles this year. This group of team leaders will be enhanced by the introduction of a local level 2 qualification course in the autumn of 2024, the benefits of which we should see in 2025.

Walking Tennis Expansion

Great work has been done by Rushmere and Heyford Tennis, both
of which have established large and thriving walking tennis
programmes. These initiatives have provided an excellent
opportunity for players of all abilities to engage in the sport in a more
accessible and social format. A new group has started at Middleton
Cheyney.

The Cube Disability Engagement

 The Cube Disability has made significant strides in tennis participation, with nearly 100 individuals actively engaged in weekly **tennis activities**. This remarkable level of involvement highlights the impact of inclusive programming and structured sessions tailored for individuals with disabilities.

Adaptive Padel at Brampton Heath Golf Club

A new and exciting development in adaptive tennis has been the
introduction of Adaptive Padel sessions at Brampton Heath Golf
Club. These sessions are taking full advantage of the club's four
brand-new Padel courts, providing a fresh and dynamic way for
individuals with varying needs to engage in racket sports.

Tennis Leadership Courses

- The **Tennis Leadership courses** have been an overwhelming success, empowering young leaders with additional needs to develop skills and confidence in coaching and leading sessions. Schools such as **Billing Brook, Purple Oaks, and Northgate** have played a crucial role in nurturing young leaders, ensuring that the next generation of inclusive tennis coaches is well-equipped and motivated.
- Pickleball remains popular with groups at **Dallington** and **Towcester Leisure Centre**.
- The Disability Inclusive **Sports Club** continues, as does other local initiatives including **Fun Days**, **Have a Go Days**, increased **wheelchair user** sessions, **sensory tennis** and much more.

The progress made in 2024 has set a strong foundation for the continued growth of inclusive tennis and increased participation across the county. A huge thank you to all clubs, schools, and organisations involved in making this year such a success!
